



Lease update

As we reported at last year's AGM, in 2017 we were granted an Asset of Community Value (ACV) by LBTH and this award protects us for the next five years. Since the AGM we have been working hard to move things forward and have established that we were granted formal 'self-management' by LBTH in 1978 which forms the basis of our relationship with LBTH since.

The next step was to formally establish our 'statutory' status under the 1925 Allotment Act as being a 'Statutory Allotment' and also to get a formal independent lease arrangement with LBTH. This should have been easy but has proved increasingly frustrating. Nevertheless it does still remain on the table.

However, we have made significant progress on the independent lease and are currently in legal discussions with LBTH over a potential arrangement which would negate the need to establish the statutory status and secure our tenure for a considerable time into the future.

We are working in partnership with the National Allotment Association who are represented in the discussions and will also involve their legal representatives when we have something firm on the table.

It is hoped that a major announcement may be possible by the AGM which would need to be presented and ratified by you. If any decisions are required before then, we may have to call an EGM and will let you know.

Compost bins and Greenhouses



We're pleased to announce our new communal area on the lower allotment is finished! Special thanks to Martyn and Brian for redeveloping this area as it's been a big job. Six compost bins have been installed and four allotment holders are now renting space within the two new greenhouses. If these prove popular we will look to raise funds for a greenhouse on the upper allotments. Let us know if you are interested.

It's a very peaceful corner and we will shortly be adding a communal bench so if you want to sit and rest a while from the midday sun this is the ideal place to do so!

Our Flowers for All campaign has been a terrific success with all 450 plants going to good homes. Many plot holders

benefited from flowers specifically grown to encourage beneficial insects onto their plots as well as putting food on our plates. Plants we grew were: Sweetpeas, borage, calendula, marigolds, tomatoes, cucumbers, cucamelons,

courgettes, beans, squash and pumpkins. If you managed to grab some of the goodies we hope they bring you much joy. Thanks to Paula and Tatiana for growing everything from seed!

Fresh Ideas

As our long-standing allotment holders will already know, maintaining an allotment can be hard work. Whatever your circumstance, keeping on top of digging, sowing, weeding, watering, tying in, pinching out and harvesting as well as many other things can be time consuming and well, a bit overwhelming.

Earlier this year we consulted the NAS (National Allotment Society) for some fresh ideas to help our new plot holders and existing plot holders who might be struggling to maintain a full plot. We decided to trial two new approaches.

New Half Plots

We have increased the number of half plots available and you may have noticed the two new half plots on the upper allotments. These plots are for new plot holders until they are ready to move up to a full plot and anyone who would like to downsize. We are looking carefully at where plots can be split and have capped the number to 10% of our total number of plots.

New Allotment Holders - Probation Period

We have introduced a twelve month probation period for all new plot holders. This means that they do not need to cultivate our recommended 80% straight away which can seem a bit daunting and has been resulting in too many failed plot inspections. New plot holders will be required to cultivate their plot in the following way:

- 25% in 3 months
- 50% in 6 months
- 80% in 12 months

If these trials are a success we will look to formalise.

Flower Garden Upper Allotment

Some of you may have noticed a small patch of land as you enter the site via the Mudchute gate looking rather sorry for itself over winter. It has now been planted up with a variety of native plants which should bring a splash of colour and beneficial insects throughout the summer months.

What you could be harvesting, sowing and planting now

There are so many crops to harvest in July, so we've picked our favourites.

1. Courgettes
2. Blueberries
3. Shallots and onions
4. Runner beans
5. Cucumbers

To ensure a succession of crops throughout the next few months don't forget to sow:

1. Radish
2. Spring onions
3. Lettuce
4. Kohlrabi
5. Carrots

If you've raised your own plants or bought plug plants, now is the ideal time to plant out winter crops:

1. Cabbage
2. Purple sprouting broccoli
3. Kale
4. Spinach
5. Chard
